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

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

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Selamat Datang

Selamat Datang means 'Welcome' in Malay. Please spare a few moments to read about the features of our aircraft as you start your journey with Royal Brunei Airlines.

Safety features

Before take-off, our cabin crew will demonstrate the safety procedures. More information may be found in the illustrated safety card in the seat pocket in front of you. During take-off, your seatbelt must be fastened. Wear your seatbelt whenever you are seated as a precaution against air turbulence. Upon landing, please remain seated until our aircraft comes to a complete stop.

Liquids, Aerosols and Gels (LAG) restrictions

Security regulations at many airports that Royal Brunei Airlines now fly to limit the amount of liquids, aerosols and gels that can be taken through the security screening point. Passengers transiting through airports and carrying any liquids, pastes and gels in containers over 100ml may be asked to dispose of the items at security checkpoints.

These restrictions may affect your ability to carry duty-free purchases onboard the aircraft. Customers are advised to check with duty free personnel before making their purchases.

The hand-carry baggage restrictions at Brunei International Airport are as follows:

- All liquids, aerosols and gels must be carried in containers of no greater than 100ml/3.3oz capacity (approximately 100gm in weight).
- All containers must fit comfortably in a transparent, resealable plastic bag.
- The plastic bag must be no greater than 1 litre in capacity.
- There is a limit of one plastic bag per passenger.
- The plastic bag must be removed from carry on baggage and presented to security personnel at the checkpoint for inspection and separate x-ray screening.
- Containers larger than 100ml/3.3oz will not be accepted, even if only partially full.

The new regulations make an exception for medicines and dietary supplements needed during a flight, including baby food. Proof of need may be required.

Hand luggage

You may store your hand luggage in the overhead lockers or under the seat in front of you. Please do not hesitate to ask our cabin crew for help in stowing your luggage properly. Be careful when opening the overhead luggage compartments, as items dislodged by aircraft movement may fall on you or fellow passengers.

Cuisine

We offer Western and Oriental meals. If you are on a special diet or require vegetarian meals, child or baby food, please inform us when making your flight reservation or two weeks prior to departure date.

Business Class passengers on long-haul flights can now select the meals they desire at a time that suits them. 'Dine upon Request' is available throughout the flight up until 90 minutes before landing.

Fitness tips

You can ease discomfort caused by pressure on your ears during take-off, landing or changes in altitude by yawning, swallowing, pinching your nose gently while exhaling or by sucking on a candy. On long flights, drink plenty of water and non-alcoholic drinks to relieve the effects of dehydration. You can ask our cabin crew for non-prescription pain-relief medicines. Please inform us when making your flight reservation if you have to administer special medication, such as insulin injections to yourself during the flight. Aerial route video

A special feature of our B767 aircraft is the aerial route video display, which indicates our geographical position, direction, altitude and speed.





Inflight entertainment

Earphones will be provided for *SkyShow*, Royal Brunei Airlines' inflight video and audio entertainment system. For programme details, please refer to the *SkyShow* entertainment guide booklet located in the seat pocket in front of you. The sockets for the earphones and channel/volume remote control are located in your seat armrest.

Reconfirmation

For passengers travelling to and from the Middle East, please reconfirm your departure flight at least 72 hours in advance with the local Royal Brunei Airlines office or your travel agent. Failure to do so could result in the cancellation of your reservations. A non-reconfirmation policy applies to RBA's European, Australian, New Zealand, Asean and the Orient routes. However, passengers are advised to contact the nearest RBA office or their travel agents should they wish to cancel or change their return or onward reservations.

Duty-free shopping

At the Brunei International Airport, Royal Brunei Trading runs the Brunei Duty-Free Shops at the arrival and departure halls.

Check-in

Check-in counters at the Brunei International Airport are open three hours before flight departure. Passengers are advised to check in at least two hours before departure in order to allow for security and baggage checks. Check-in counters will be closed 45 minutes before departure, after which no boarding passes will be issued. Royal Brunei Airlines also advises its passengers to reach the boarding gate 20 minutes before the flight departs in order to avoid missing their flights.

Use of electronic equipment

Mobile phones cannot be used at any time during the flight. They should be switched off as soon as the cabin crew makes the announcement. Also included in this list of equipment which cannot be used at any time once on board the aircraft are: citizen's band (CB) radio, remote-controlled devices (such as radio-controlled toys), and transmitting devices that emit radio frequencies.

The following devices may be used on board, except during take-off, initial climb, approach and landing: personal computers, FM receivers, calculators, electronic shavers, audio and video recorders, hand-held computer games (e.g. Gameboy), and playback devices. These devices can interfere with the aircraft's electronic equipment, thus compromising aircraft safety and endangering the lives of passengers and crew.

Non-smoking policy

Royal Brunei Airlines operates non-smoking flights to all destinations.

Alcohol-free environment policy

Royal Brunei Airlines operates alcohol-free flights to all destinations.

Transit Tour programme

A complimentary transit program is available for all our passengers who are on transit at Brunei International Airport for more than five (5) hours.



Subject to transit time, eligible passengers* can either opt for:

- Complimentary transit tours and/or
- A complimentary set meal at Royal Brunei Catering's Coffee Garden located near Gate 1 in the Departure Hall.

* Complimentary set meals are only available for transit passengers from Brisbane, Perth, Auckland and London.

For those who wish to join the tours, cabin crew will distribute Immigration Arrival and Health forms for clearance to enter Brunei Darussalam. Kindly fill in the forms accordingly. Upon arrival, please contact our ground staff at the transfer desk to register for the transit programme.

Please be advised that seats are limited on the tours. We hope you enjoy your transit in Brunei Darussalam before continuing your journey.

RBA enhances flight schedule

From 25 October, 2009, Royal Brunei Airlines passengers will have more flexibility when it comes to booking flights as the airline increases flight frequencies to Singapore, Jakarta, Manila and Jeddah.

Singapore flights will operate 17 times weekly with additional day time flights on Monday, Friday and Sunday departing Brunei at 1.20pm and arriving at 3.20pm.

Meanwhile, Manila services will increase to eight times weekly and Jakarta services will increase to six times weekly. The increase in services for Jeddah from October to December will strengthen RBA's positioning for Jeddah as a niche market.

"RBA is responding to market demand in the Region. We are focused on providing connectivity to our customers and the new Winter schedule allows greater flexibility to connect to Europe and the Middle East," said Robert Yang, Chief Executive Officer of Royal Brunei Airlines.

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Noosa by the Sea

With the laidback charm of Sydney and the affluent air of Paris, **Anis Ramli** finds Noosa in Queensland, Australia, a curious mix of lifestyles that's the perfect recipe for a glorious getaway.

Like most visitors to Queensland, the idea of a vacation to this northeastern state of Australia would likely include the presumption that it consists of nothing more than multiple rides at theme parks or riding the surf at Gold Coast. The branding of the Sunshine State as a thrill-seeker's paradise has been ingrained in us so much that it has perhaps locked us in a supine state that makes further explorations unnecessary.

Yet, a 90-minute drive north from Brisbane, Queensland's capital, will bring you to a different strip of the Sunshine Coast, where the tiny village of Noosa remains one of the best kept secrets for a glorious getaway. That is, until now.

More than a costal town, Noosa began to court vacationers back in the mid 1980s with its mix of tropical microclimate, rainforest rimmed bays and sun-kissed beaches. The village is almost completely surrounded by water, and even today, a ferry-ride along the meandering Noosa River that frames the town's inland flanks provides spectacular sights of the town and its neighbourhood.

Speak to any local and there are always nuggets of Noosa's delights that offer insights as to what makes locals stay and visitors return. There's the Noosa National Park, a haven for walkers, birdwatchers and koala lovers, whose entrance via a boardwalk stroll sits a mere five minutes' walk from the town centre. To the east of the park is Alexandria Bay, where those in the know head for quiet beach time away from the maddening crowd of Main Beach.


The pulse of the town itself, Hastings Street, is a charming collection of stylish cafés, alfresco restaurants and designer boutiques that have a distinct European flair to them. Perhaps it's the way the cafés turn their chairs on the terraces to face the street, making them *très chic*. The leafy boulevard itself provides a charming, all-season stroll, with many opportune spots to browse, explore and relax.

At the end of the street is Main Beach, whose calm waters are a favourite with kayakers. Stay awhile on the beach and you may even see pods of bottlenose dolphins from the coastal track. Further ahead is Noosa Woods, a dedicated ground that hosts summer concerts and winter festivals, with picnic and barbeque spots. Noosa's many bays also provide some of the best point breaks in Australia. Every March, surfers world over take part in the annual Festival of Surfing, riding the waves from Granite Bay at the Noosa National Park into Main Beach.

For all that Noosa has going for it, it could have well followed in the footsteps of Gold Coast's frenzied pace; sullen skyscrapers jostling for the best views, simultaneously changing the once magical coastline into a dreary concrete coast. In fact, Noosa almost experienced a similar fate. Plans were underway in the mid 1980s for a massive development project next to the Great Sandy National Park that included a 600-room hotel, two resorts, a 27-hole golf course, an artificial lake, a marina and an airport.

The plans were scrapped upon pressure from a group of local environmentalists. Today, Noosa's buildings are no higher than the tree line. Even the shops at Hastings Street demonstrate a certain class. In place of mass two-dollar, thrift shops that are the leitmotif of any tourist spot, there are signature stores and international brands. There's not even a whiff from fast food outlets that to this day, remain firmly out of the area, relegated to adjoining neighbourhoods, such as Noosa Junction and Noosaville.

That isn't to say there aren't options to suit all budgets. On the contrary, whether it's latte for breakfast by the beach or fish-and-chips on the run for lunch, dining at Noosa is one of the trip's best pleasures. Restaurants serve fresh seasonal produce farmed from the hinterlands and seafood sourced from the surrounding waters. Local cuisine often mix with Asian and European influences, creating a potpourri of flavours that has earned Noosa the reputation of Queensland's epicurean capital. Dining alfresco at the restaurants on Hastings Street is one of Noosa's most memorable experiences.



For a new take on dining, catch the Noosa Ferry from the Sheraton Jetty near Hastings to dine at Wasabi Restaurant and Bar on Noosa Sound. Perched on the Noosa River, Wasabi's award-winning menu is matched only by the stunning scenery. Chef Shinichi Maeda creates fresh *sashimi* platter from local Mooloolaba yellowfin tuna and Tasmanian ocean trout, and presents tantalising fusion meals such as *wagyu* beef with sesame dressing and potato salad.

Choosing where to stay in Noosa is also a delight. There are discreet boutique accommodations and 5-start luxury hotels with drop dead views of the waters. Or, opt for self-contained holiday flats and family apartments that provide for longer-staying guests. One fine example is the Noosa Entrance Waterfront Resort, a cluster of luxury apartments that hug a manmade canal. It's located in the quiet neighbourhood of Noosaville, yet Noosa's charm is undeniable in its landscaping. Four private jetties provide the perfect waterfront dwelling for boat owners, or you can hire kayaks that will take you straight into the heart of Noosa River. The self-contained apartments have lounge decks for barbeques and with four pools to choose from amid







a tropical garden setting. Yet, despite its seclusion, the resort is just a short drive away to the famous Hastings Street, and the Sunday Noosa Farmers' Market on the grounds of the Aussie Rules Football. You can purchase local produce, fruits, cheese, yoghurt and good coffee to bring back to the apartment.

Noosa's natural setting courts well-heeled Australians and global guests to its seaside village as the perfect holiday getaway. It charms visitors with its success in maintaining the delicate balance between nature and development. For that, Noosa was recently awarded the *Biosphere Reserve* status by UNESCO, the global organisation that also awards World Heritage Listings. In recognising Noosa's sustainable approach to managing the natural environment, which includes a ban on high rise buildings and a population cap, Noosa will continue to be the best accidental discovery for vacationers this side of Queensland.

A River Runs Through

Amidst the super cities that dot China, the idyllic beauty of Guilin in Southern China with its karst mountains and ancient waterways, presents a landscape and a lifestyle that seems literally frozen in time. Words & photographs by **Mark Parren Taylor.**

There's a Chinese saying that an impressive view must be heard rather than seen, suggesting that even the loveliest landscape cannot compete with the beauty of a vista imagined through another person's words. Guilin is the exception that proves that rule: The Chinese are universally proud of the Li River panorama and the mythical mountains that rise along the edges of the water. To a true connoisseur of all things legendary from China, the River Li and the ethereal landscape of Guilin share the same position alongside other oft-quoted, must-see sights of the Great Wall and Hangzhou's West Lake.

Guilin was recently crowned as China's 'Number One City Destination'. China's Xinhua News Agency ran a brief article, but there wasn't much in it that could have surprised the reader. The Chinese have known for centuries how magnificent Guilin's Li River is. Of course, it is a modern phenomenon that so many tourists from China and around the globe are able to visit the city – about 12 million last year – but painters and poets, emperors and engineers have been visiting Guilin, founded over 2,000 years. The out-of-this-world rock formations and stretched, towering hills have been treasured for so long, that it was probably a national park long before the concept existed. To this day it is surprisingly unspoilt. As a Shanghainese friend of mine frequently likes to tease, "China would be beautiful if it wasn't for the Chinese!" From his viewpoint, amidst the skyscrapers and shopping malls of Shanghai, it may be hard to imagine an environment untouched by the last two centuries, but take a trip along the Li River and you'll witness a landscape as pristine as any.

Despite appearances however, climate change is starting to take its toll on this countryside: The rainy season sees flooding with strong and damaging currents; the winter months herald a drought that gets longer every year. In January and February, the Li River can be so shallow, it is not navigable in parts. And those sections that are, test tourist boat captains to the limit. decided to take a trip on one of the cruisers that head out from the docks for a short ride south of Guilin. During the entire journey, I was unable to leave the viewing deck, as I was awestruck by the romantic landscape slipping past. If the clarity of the water was an arresting sight, ducks bobbing about and tipping under to poke at stones on the riverbed and among the deep green weeds, added a pastoral charm to the already sylvan surroundings. These tourist boats needed only a shallow draught but nonetheless, mine made surprising manoeuvres to remain in deep-enough water and still, there was the occasional dull scrape as the hull kissed the rocks. The Li River finds its flow in the Mao'er Mountains to the north of Guilin and then heads 437 kilometres south to join the Xijiang, the western tributary of the Pearl River. But it is the 80 kilometres stretch between Guilin and Yangshuo that is the true source of national pride. The Li flows past majestic rock formations and groves of billowing, feathery bamboo that crowd the banks. Beyond, many peaks are thick with forest. Look closely and some hillsides are newly planted with telltale regular rows of conifers. This is a recent move to replace lost forest coverage that has occurred steadily since the 1950s. With the aim of stemming ruinous soil erosion and more importantly, to lessen the seasonal swing between flood and drought, the banks of the Li are slowly but steadily pulling on a green mantle.







Fortunately, visitor numbers haven't followed the same pattern as the local water table. Naturally, summer is the high season but winter draws its fair share of visitors. Authorities are concerned that if key attractions, such as the river cruises, are adversely affected by low water, this may deter people from taking their winter break in Guilin.

Undoubtedly, the Li River is central to Guilin's character. At dawn, along the waterfront close to Fubo Shan, fishermen set out trays of catch and later in the day, old men head out onto the waters with their cormorants to catch fish. It's not done for tourists. There's no fanfare or photo opportunity. It's simply a chance for these men to get some exercise, while their time and either supplement the food on their tables or the money in their pockets.

Visitors are as keen to sample local recipes and ingredients as to see the big rocks and diving birds. Guilin's specialities include Li River carp and snails, taro from nearby Lipu, osmanthus tea and a hearty *lajiaojiang* sauce of chilli, garlic and fermented

soybean. Perhaps above all, the breakfast noodle *mi fen* that seems to be universally slurped in the morning, is the defining local dish.

Yanghsuo, at the other end of the famous stretch of Li River, is even more tightly squeezed by encroaching limestone peaks and has retained an old town atmosphere, with its winding lanes and higgledy-piggledy shops. At the end of the afternoon, residents bring tables and chairs onto the streets and play cards, eat or knit and natter about the day's events. The sun disappears quickly behind the karsts but the gentle evening air catches its rays and casts a luscious glow between the mountains and along the busy streets. This is the true magic of the Guilin landscape. A common phrase throughout China is Guilin shan shui ja tian xia meaning 'Guilin's mountains and waters are the best under all heaven' and as evening approaches there's no place I'd rather be 'under all heaven'. 🍏

BAY of the SOMME

A member of the 'Club of the Most Beautiful Bays of the World', Bay of the Somme is also big on eco-friendly tourism and Zero Carbon Emission policies. That explains why wildlife, artists and tourists keep returning to this spot along the English Channel in Northern France. Words & photographs by **John Brunton**. The Somme usually conjures up sombre images of World War One battles and memorial graveyards but this little-known corner of Northern France is worth discovering for a very different reason. A narrow road from the grand cathedral town of Abbeville accompanies the meandering river Somme towards the Channel. As the sea suddenly comes into view and the river dramatically widens out into its estuary, there is a spectacular change in the landscape. This is what the *French call La Baie de Somme*; one of the most beautiful and well preserved natural bays in France.

You are immediately confronted by the breathtaking landscape whose form and colours change with the tide, invaded by the sea at high tide, abandoned at low tide, and transformed into undulating grassy dunes, rivulets and swirling eddies. At high tide, dozens of colourful sautrelliers or 'toy-like shrimpers' navigate tricky channels to sail out to sea, while kayaks and canoes head in the other direction to explore the farthest corners of the pristine wetlands. When the tide goes out, fishermen come out to dig the sand for clams, duck hunters trek out to their hides, shepherds lead out sheep to graze on the salty grass, and thousands of migrating birds flit back and forth, because the bay is one of the major migratory crossroads of Europe. This spot is also where William the Conqueror hid his fleet before sailing over to England for the Battle of Hastings in 1066, and today, remains a hidden natural paradise that is unspoilt, undeveloped and still undiscovered.

The Somme's bay stretches round for 14 kilometres and on each side is a markedly different seaside resort. Saint Valery-sur-Somme is very much a picture-postcard village, with fishing and sailing boats bobbing in the port, imposing medieval ramparts with an opulent Gothic church, and a long waterside boardwalk lined with sumptuous 19th century villas that have been artistic retreats for the likes of Victor Hugo, Jules Verne, Albert Sisley and Edgar Degas.

With travellers from all around the world becoming more aware of their carbon footprint and enthusiastic to embrace ideas that create a more sustainable form of tourism, the local inhabitants of this eco-friendly region have made an important initiative to promote a host of Zero Carbon activities. Obviously people will have to travel here by some means or other but the idea is that when visitors are settled down in their hotel or charming Bed & Breakfast, they can then spend the rest of the vacation in an endless variety of outdoor pursuits that burn little or no carbon fuel.


The equestrian centre Cavalcade in Le Crotoy organises romantic sunset horse riding along the water's edge at the Bay's low tide. Visitors can rent a bike for the day and trek out to the lighthouse at La Pointe du Hourdel, at the outer point of the bay with amazing panoramic views. Follow next, a magical path along the wild sand dunes, as far as the old-fashioned seaside town of Cayeux, where the beach promenade is marked by charming, brightly-coloured, wooden



bathing cabins that haven't changed since the 19th century. For those who stay in the chic designer B&B Velocipede, free use of a bike is even included in the room rate! For the more adventurous, when the tide is high, the bay is perfect for exploring by kayak.

Saint Valery is the best place to base yourself for exploring, with a wide range of accommodation, and at low tide, the most unforgettable experience of joining a nature walk that takes you right across to the bay's other resort, Le Crotoy. Although the bay looks deceptively flat, be prepared for a strenuous three-hour trek. The guides kit everyone out in Wellington boots, and these are very necessary as you start clambering through gulleys and up steep grassy mini-cliffs, known as micro falaises, often sinking into thick cloying mud. All the time the guide points out different birds flying above, nesting on higher ground, or just digging their beaks into the sand in search of worms. Growing wild in the sand are delicious, edible sea-ferns or salicornes, which can be eaten raw or pickled.

Arriving at Le Crotoy, the view is dominated by a 19th century hotel looking out over the bay. Called *Les Tourelles*, this is a stylish place to stay, looking more like a fashionable holiday retreat at the Hamptons on Long Island rather than northern France. The owners of the hotel have created a Zero Carbon Charter for the bay and guests are assured that carbon emission has been reduced to the absolute minimum.



Eating out is a big attraction in Le Crotoy, especially if you reserve at the homely Auberge de la Marine. It looks like a simple bistro but the chefs create wonderful cuisine and only use products sourced from the bay. Depending on the night's fishing, you could order a grilled sole, tasty mackerel fillets marinated in vinegar and onions, or a hearty fish and seafood stew served with crunchy *salicornes*.

Anyone interested in wildlife shouldn't leave before visiting Le Parc du Marquenterre, a 220-hectare protected park of wind-swept dunes that begins just as the bay peters out past Le Crotoy. This is a temporary home for thousands of migratory birds – more than 300 species – that stop off here between Russia, Africa and the Arctic. For those up for another nature trek, there is a fascinating 7-kilometre marked walk through the park.

The list of activities available at *La Baie de Somme* is almost endless, but visitors to this northern reaches of France return home knowing that they leave the Bay in its pristine state, so that it will continue not only attracting wildlife and the occasional invading forces to its shore, but remains as one of the world's foremost eco-friendly destinations.

Unveiling Brune's Underwater Wonder

Relatively untouched, the rich and diverse marine environment of Brunei Darussalam springs forth an underwater paradise that rivals some of the best underwater habitats of the world. Words by **Simon Enderby** & photographs by **Seok Wun Au Young** and **Simon Enderby**

Brunei Darussalam is perhaps best known for its oil rich resources but over recent years the authorities of this tiny state and players from its tourism industry have turned their attention towards a greener resource. This new resource is readily available and is well on its way to put Brunei on the global map that includes the flora and fauna of the Bornean rainforest and, the biologically rich waters of the ocean that fronts Brunei.

Realising the importance of preserving the natural landscape, a ban on unlicensed commercial logging has ensured the survival of Brunei's rainforest, which in turn has enabled the earth to remain green while allowing the flora and fauna to flourish. Amazing eco-friendly tourism opportunities too have sprung up, proving that you can still enjoy the earth without wiping out the natural beauty in the name of tourism. Similarly and even more recently, Brunei has come to realise that another treasure trove of natural wonders is just waiting to be explored, albeit judiciously, to benefit the country's long term tourism blueprint. The coastal waters and oceans of Brunei Darussalam is teeming with amazing marine life and, the biological richness of its coral reef and marine environment is on par with some of the more renowned waters around the world. While others may have been visited once too often, Brunei's waters remain relatively unknown and untouched, hence making it a richer playground for the citizens of the deep.

The country has known that there was an abundance of marine life just offshore through its developing fishing industry. However, this is just the tip of the iceberg and reflects just a minute section of the rich biodiversity that can be found in its seas, coral reefs, mangroves and near-shore waters. The sheer diversity and abundance of marine life found here has only recently been fully realised after some of the worlds biggest names in marine science were brought together by the Brunei Fisheries Department to undertake a detailed study.






Dr Mark Erdmann headed the survey team along with renowned tropical reef fish expert Dr Gerry Allen, coral experts Dr Lyndon Devantier and Emre Turek, malacologist (sea shell expert) Markus Ruf and, underwater film and photography company Scubazoo Images. Over the course of two survey periods totaling seven weeks, the team, supported and guided by research staff from the Brunei Fisheries Department, identified 34 research sites for investigation, with terrain ranging from inshore mangroves to shallow patch reefs to offshore drilling platforms. After a total of 500 manhours spent underwater, the final results clearly showed that Brunei's marine environment rivals that of Australia's Great Barrier Reef and Indonesia's Bunaken Marine Park, with nearly 400 species of hard corals, over 667 species of tropical fish and over 475 species of

molluscs identified so far. It's quite possible these numbers will rise even further once detailed studies of some of the samples are completed. Two new books have also been published as a result of the survey – *The Tropical Reef Fishes of Brunei* by Dr Gerry Allen and *The Coral Reefs of Brunei Darussalam* by Dr Lyndon Devantier and Emre Turek.

Many of the off-shore reef sites were found to have an extremely high bio-diverse coral cover with an intense mix of hard and soft corals, whilst others were rich in macro critters and a wide range of nudibranchs, several that they haven't seen before including one *Bornella* species, which has yet to be described. This joined a growing list of new or undescribed species of corals and fish as the team widened their search.







Along with the rich biodiversity and great underwater visibility the team was surprised to find a rich mix of hard and soft corals, somewhat reminiscent of the coral reefs of the Caribbean. Under normal circumstances this abundant mixing would not occur, as the hard corals would out-compete the soft corals and eventually drive them out of the shallows into the deeper waters, where sunlight levels are lower and hard corals find it more difficult to grow.

Unfortunately, as with all of the world's marine environments, Brunei's coral reefs haven't escaped the hand of man, as the research team identified several dive locations with evidence of fishing encroachment. However, interestingly the numbers of fish were still high and on the whole, the reefs were in very good condition. There is a silver lining to this dark cloud of human interference. As a result, from the comprehensive survey and acknowledgement of the findings, the Brunei Fisheries Department is now in the process of formulating a network of Marine Protected Areas to safeguard its rich coral reefs. This highly responsible approach will in-turn guarantee the long term safety of Brunei's underwater treasures, as well as allow those areas that have been affected by man's activities in the past to rehabilitate and rebound. With the guaranteed safety of this incredibly bio-diverse resource and, with the growing interest in marine tourism, especially that of scuba diving and snorkeling, Brunei's tourism industry shall now be able to package both its Reefs and Rainforests to both national and international visitors.


Mungkin Negara Brunei Darussalam lebih terkenal dengan kekayaan sumber petroliam tetapi sejak kebelakangan ini, pihak berkuasa berserta penggerak-penggerak utama dalam bidang pelancongan mula memaling ke arah sumber yang lebih hijau. Sumber baru ini sedia ada dan mampu meletakkan Negara Brunei Darussalam di persada dunia berpunca daripada kekayaan dan kepelbagaiannya. Sumber semulajadi yang dimaksudkan ini terdiri daripada fauna dan flora hutan hujan Borneo dan alam marin yang kaya di laut Negara Brunei Darussalam.

Menyedari akan kepentingan pemeliharaan landskap semulajadi, larangan ke atas pembalakan komersil yang tidak berlesen telah memastikan kewujudan hutan hujan Negara Brunei Darussalam. Sejajar dengan itu, kesuburan bumi terus menghijau dan pelbagai flora dan fauna berkembang subur. Berbagai peluang pelancongan mesra alam juga kini muncul dan membuktikan bahawa keindahan bumi boleh dinikmati tanpa merosakkan alam semula jadi di sebalik nama pelancongan. Tambahan pula, Negara Brunei Darussalam meyedari akan kewujudan sebuah lagi khazanah semula jadi, yang jika diterokai secara bijak, boleh membawa pulangan yang berganda kepada rangka tindakan jangka panjang sektor pelancongan. Kawasan perairan pantai dan laut Negara Brunei Darussalam kaya dengan kehidupan marin, di mana kekayaan biologikal terumbu karang setanding dengan alam marin terkenal seantero. Tempat-tempat terkenal yang lain mungkin sering dikunjungi pelawat, manakala perairan Brunei masih terlindung dan ini menjadikannya habitat kehidupan marin yang amat kaya.

Kesultanan ini sedia maklum akan kehadiran alam marin yang kaya di sekitar perairannya melalui industri perikanan yang sedang membangun. Namun, ini mencerminkan hanya sebahagian kecil daripada kepelbagaian yang terdapat dalam laut, terumbu karang, hutan bakau dan perairan pantai. Tahap kekayaan dan kepelbagaian kehidupan marin di sini hanya baru-baru ini disedari apabila beberapa individu terkenal dalam bidang sains marin dibawa oleh Jabatan Perikanan Brunei untuk membuat kajian secara lebih mendalam.

Dr Mark Erdmann mengetuai pasukan penyelidikan bersama pakar ikan terumbu karang Dr Gerry Allen; pakar terumbu karang Dr Lyndon Devantier dan Emre Turek; ahli malakologi (pakar haiwan cengkerang) Markus Ruf dan pasukan perfileman dan fotografi bawah air dari Scubazoo Images. Dalam jangkamasa tujuh minggu bersamaan dua sessi penyelidikan, pasukan ini dibantu Jabatan Perikanan Brunei, telah mengenalpasti 34 lokasi di perairan Brunei untuk tujuan kajian, dengan bentuk rupa bumi menganjur kawasan bakau pendalaman sehingga ke tapak terumbu karang cetek dan pelantar cari gali. Setelah lebih 500 jam berada di bawah air, keputusan akhir memaparkan bahawa persekitaran marin di Negara Brunei Darussalam setanding dengan Terumbu Karang Besar di Australia dan Taman Marin Bunaken di Indonesia. Lebih 4,000 spesis karang keras, lebih 667 spesis ikan tropika dan lebih 475 spesis moluska dikenalpasti setakat ini. Kemungkinan angka ini akan meningkat apabila kajian yang lebih terperinci dijalankan. Dua naskah buku juga telah diterbitkan hasil daripada kajian ini: *The Tropical Reef Fishes of Brunei* oleh Dr Gerry Allen dan *The Coral Reefs of Brunei Darussalam* oleh Dr Lyndon Devantier dan Emre Turek.

Kebanyakkan kawasan terumbu karang di perairan pantai ternyata mempunyai kadar liputan biodiversiti karang yang tinggi yang terdiri daripada karang lembut dan keras. Tempat-tempat lain pula kaya dengan kehidupan makro dan pelbagai spesis *nudibranch*, sesetengah yang sehingga kini belum

ditemui termasuk satu spesis *Bornella* yang belum dapat dijelaskan. Selari dengan penyelidikan yang semakin giat, spesis ini disenaraikan dalam bilangan spesis ikan dan karang yang baru ditemui.

Sejajar dengan kekayaan biodiversiti dan kadar penglihatan bawah air yang jelas, pasukan ini teruja dengan percampuran karang keras dan lembut yang tidak ubah seperti apa yang terdapat di Caribbean. Dalam keadaan biasa, percampuran ini tidak akan berlaku kerana karang keras akan menewaskan karang lembut dan memaksa karang lembut keluar dari perairan cetek dan ke dalam kawasan air dalam di mana cahaya matahari tidak kesampaian dan karang keras tidak mudah hidup.

Malangnya, seperti persekitaran marin dunia yang lain, pasukan penyelidik mendapati terumbu karang Brunei turut diancam oleh kegiatan manusia melalui aktiviti perikanan. Namun, jumlah ikan masih tinggi dan secara keseluruhan, terumbu masih dalam keadaan yang memuaskan. Walaupun begitu, ada juga kebaikan yang muncul daripada gangguan aktiviti manusia. Berdasarkan penyelidikan komprehensif dan penyahihan maklumat yang dijumpai, Jabatan Perikanan Brunei kini dalam proses merangka satu rangkaian Kawasan Marin yang Terlindung untuk memelihara terumbu karang yang kaya ini. Kaedah ini akan memastikan keselamatan jangka panjang khazanah bawah laut Negara Brunei Darussalam sambil memulihara kawasan yang tercemar atau terganggu. Dengan jaminan keselamatan ke atas sumber biodiversiti ini dan bertambahnya minat terhadap pelancongan marin, terutama sekali dalam aktiviti selaman skuba dan mensnorkel, industri pelancongan Brunei kini boleh menyediakan pakej pelancongan hutan hujan dan terumbu kepada pelawat dalam dan luar negara. 🍏

This water-wise alternative to conventional dyes uses 95 percent less water to create prints, and up to 88 percent less water to create solid colours, compared to typical textile industry water consumption. It also doesn't pollute water, reduces energy use, and slashes production costs. Another environmental advantage to the bags is that they use Repreve, a yarn from 100 percent recycled materials. Applegate's bags are also made to order, a move that reduces waste. Her talent for quirky yet comely designs can be seen through the choice of prints available, ranging from paisley butterflies and flowers and a happy graffiti that features squirrels, sheep, and whales.

Part of Olsen Haus' profit benefits PETA, Farm Sanctuary, Greenpeace and the Theosophical Society.

Beside manufacturing with a focus on low impact materials and production methods, the Hanoi-based Song is also a World Fair Trade Organisation member (WFTO) and uses a lot of hand embroidery work in its creation, helping and providing work for many low income women and artisans in remote villages throughout Vietnam. Founded by French-born, Hanoibased designer Valerie McKenzie, Song, which literally means 'to live' or 'life' in Vietnamese, was inspired by her desire to create fashion beyond collections – one that links to a way of life.

McKenzie designs clothes that are simple, fussfree yet, pleasing to the eye. She uses modern and traditional fabrics such as bamboo fibre, silk and hemp, combining traditional material with modern aesthetics. Choosing organic over chemically treated materials and 100 percent handmade over machinebased embroidery in all operation and production decisions, McKenzie has succeeded in making Song a staple among eco-conscious fashionistas and, was recently featured on Cameron Diaz in the green issue of 2009 June's Vogue. Her Cruise 2010 line is almost Zen-like in appearance, with draped tank dresses in cotton bamboo and winged-sleeve A-line tunics made of organic cotton. Song now has shops in Vietnam, Cambodia and Singapore, with the first Australian boutique slated to open in 2010.

In fact, such an idea had been brimming in my mind for several years and his suggestion was simply timely," Chef Ang explained of the project. Two other organisations that participated in the project were *Dewan Bahasa dan Pustaka* (DBP) which assisted in the translations, while the State Mufti's Office verified the *halal* status of ingredients used in the cookbook. Photographer Jerome Wong further brought the cookbook to life with his photography and creative cookbook design.

The latest edition of the cookbook surely has a role to emulate to be better than ever, following the footsteps of *Collection of Recipes Volume 2*, which won a prestigious global award at the Gourmand World Cookbook Awards 2009 in Paris. RBC's cookbook was chosen for the Special Awards categories among thousands of cookbooks from 54 different countries. *Royal Brunei Catering Collection of Recipes Volume 2* won the *Best Easy Recipes Book* for Brunei Darussalam and Special Award of the Jury category in the competition.





In fact, the Special Award win was unique as RBC was the only company in Brunei Darussalam to receive a global award. Immediately following the award, a Croatian magazine even approached the company with the intention of publishing the recipes and other enquiries have continued to flow in.

According to Haji Omar Ali, RBC has been around for decades and he recalls that RBC already had thousands of recipes at hand and that it would be meaningful to compile them. The first cookbook was therefore conceptualised and was done entirely in-house with support of the Government's Information Department for photographs, design and proofreading. *Volume 2* followed soon after with the support of DBP and the State Mufti's Office. 3 red bird's eye chili 1-inch piece fresh turmeric, peeled 7 shallots, peeled 5 pips garlic, peeled

10 gm desiccated coconut* 500 ml coconut milk* 2 tsp tamarind paste* Sugar and salt to taste

Method

Marinate chicken wings with ingredients A. Roast at 180°C until half cooked. Set aside. Blend ingredients B. Set aside. Heat oil in wok. Fry ingredients B until fragrant. Add in ingredients C and slowly cook till it forms into a thick paste. Add in the roast chicken and stir till it coats the chicken. Over a slow fire, cook until done.

Mightof the Nercedes



The first thing you notice in your rear-view mirror is the expanding size of the three-pointed star coming at you on the highway. Your chivalrous side tells you to move in to let it pass. But soon, when the onrushing silhouette gets clear enough for you to realise that you are also driving one – the Mercedes Benz C230 Avantgarde. So you flick a switch and step on it and pretty soon, both cars appear to be conjoined twins and are flying along at the same pace.

Police speed cameras notwithstanding, a highway cruise in this 2.5-litre, V-6 engined new variant of the compact C-Class Mercedes allows you to enjoy the thrill of power, speed and performance with comfort and smooth handling in one neat package. Switching between a sporty performance and comfortable ride is as easy as pushing a button on the dashboard. But be warned that this 'C/S' button (COMFORT or SPORT) will not activate any afterburner in your exhaust on demand. You will still have to step on the gas to maintain distance.

Engaging one or the other activates the C230's electrically adjustable shock absorbers and fully independent suspension. Picking one over the other adjusts the damper settings at the press of a button. In SPORTS mode, the hydraulic forces of the shock absorbers are increased to achieve greater handling stability at high speeds and reduce the inherent understeer at speeds up to 120kmph. When driving normally on poor road surfaces, a soft damper setting is selected – with the choice of COMFORT mode – to maximise occupant comfort while maintaining handling stability and safety.

The electronics makes use of seven sensors, which monitor driving situations and relay information to an electronic control unitthat calculates the optimum shock absorber characteristics. The system adjusts the damping forces for each individual wheel: When driving on poor road surfaces, a soft damper setting is selected but when the road is smoother, a more dynamic setting is turned on for a spirited performance. A bit superfluous one might say for the C230 is indeed a well-behaved car. Shod with 17-inch wheels with 225/45R tyres and slightly wider 245/40R 17 at the rear, it sits on the road like a bull ready to be unleashed.

Naturally aspirated, the V6 engine that develops 204 horsepower with a torque of 245Nm at 2,900-5500 rpm is mated to Mercedes' 7G-TRONIC gearbox. The availability of seven forward gears make it possible to widen the overall spacing between bottom and top gear while at the same time reducing the spacing between one gear and the next. This results in optimum engine speeds at all times with virtually imperceptible gear changes. Immediate acceleration response comes from the ability to shift down more than one gear at a time - thereby explaining how you were able to move out of the way of your fire-breathing brethren barreling towards you a moment ago! It can be driven up to 233kmph, accelerating from zero to 100kmph in 8.6 seconds.

With all that speed on tap, safety issues are addressed with a comprehensive array of airbags. Front airbags can be supplemented by driver's knee airbags, sidebags and windowbags. Additionally, the driver has a variety of switches and controls located on the steering wheel; with F1 inspired shift paddles just behind the main spokes for gear changes.

From then on there's a whole host of acronyms patented by Mercedes including the PRE-SAFE system that takes pre-emptive measures to protect the occupants in certain hazardous situations. NECK-PRO increases protection to the driver's head and neck. It moves forward and upwards in the event of a head-on collision. ESP (Electronic Stability Program) monitors driving stability and traction. If it detects the vehicle is deviating from the direction of travel, one or more wheels are braked to stabilise the vehicle. It helps the driver when pulling away on wet or slippery roads and stabilises the car when braking. In slippery conditions, ETS (Electronic Traction Support) offers traction control which enables braking of individual wheels if they spin. Further braking assistance is available with EBV (Electronic Brake Force Distribution), which monitors and controls the brake pressure on the rear wheels to improve driving stability during braking.

The C230 has an intelligent light system using bi-xenon headlamps. This adjusts the headlamps automatically to suit the prevailing driving and weather conditions. The bi-xenon headlamps offer enhanced functions to improve illumination of the road surface and include a cornering light function. This is an active light function that moves the headlamps according to the steering movements of the front wheels. In this way, the relevant areas remain illuminated allowing the driver to recognise the presence of pedestrians, cyclists and animals while driving.

So the next time you see a three-pointed star in your rear-view mirror; it's game on!

Call East of the



Chef, restaurateur, foodie, TV personality, funny man and 'International Man of Mystery', Bobby Chinn tells us how he almost ended up a banker, if not for his love affair with food, and how he finally settled in Vietnam to pursue his dreams.

Born to a Chinese father and an Egyptian mother, how did these huge polarities in culture and upbringing colour your own appreciation of food?

I have been very open to food and learned at a very early age the diversity of it. I was open to eating a lot of dishes that an average baby would not eat. I was eating okra with tomato sauce before I could walk or talk. As a child I appreciated octopus, which freaked out the neighbours. I am not afraid to try something new or different and because of it I am open to experimentation within reason.

Having graduated with a BA in Finance & Economics, why did you end up a chef?

Outside of having a lack of interest in greed or pursuing the quest for money and all that it brings, I really did not care about the suit and tie, as it strangled my imagination and I needed to find something different. As far as I was concerned, I could have done close to anything else, but somehow I found passion in food, cooking and the lifestyle that it brought me.

What was the training like and which great chefs inspired you to go the whole nine yards with the food business?

You never stop learning; the problem is trying to remember it all! It's a profession that can leave you very knowledgeable and stupid at the same time, which is very humbling. Many learn French technique, then there is Chinese and Persian and



Turkish... you name it; it never ends. I have always been humbled by the limitation of things I knew and could do. I found that by working with really good chefs. I accelerated the learning curve in some areas while my lack of experience deprived me in others.

What I didn't learn in a kitchen, I picked it up in a book, or in travel or through simple observation. Hubert Keller was a great teacher and has a great culture at Fleur De Lys in San Francisco. That experience coupled with years at Elka, taught me quite a bit, especially working with a chef like Traci Des Jardin. I hung out with Gary Danko, picked his brains and learnt a lot about the business side. Gravlier in Bordeaux was also inspirational. I always walk away inspired to raise my bar and to accept new challenges and I think that is what every chef does. It is a work in progress and you are only as good as the last dish. There is a certain attitude in any good restaurant, and when you work with people like those mentioned here, you cultivate a deep respect for them.

You are not Vietnamese but have become Vietnam's unofficial food ambassador. How did Vietnamese cuisine enamour you?

It takes a people and a country to inspire me. I think Vietnam's history speaks for itself. It's a country that is proud in its ways, and festivals and food go hand in hand. The food is sustainable, with clean flavours, wonderful contrasting textures and colours and it's easy to make. If that isn't enough, it's also light and refreshingly healthy.

What prompted you to move to Hanoi to set up your restaurant instead of opening the same in the US?

Well, I got ran out of town in Ho Chi Minh City. Otherwise I would have stayed there. I fell in love with the people, the food, the culture, and the colourful expatriates who came here for some soul searching, or allowing themselves to try something different. I prefer living in a police state with no guns than a democracy with guns. It's also easier to ask for forgiveness when you forgot to get permission.

What would we find you eating at your own restaurant in Hanoi? Leftovers.

Your TV persona and brand of humour are great attractions in themselves, proving that food can be fun, gregarious and entertaining and that chefs need not be surly, overweight men. How did you cultivate this personality? Through many years of abuse!

Through many years of abuse

With all manners of fusion and experimental cuisines popping up in recent times, how does one learn to truly appreciate food and its provenance?

You appreciate by understanding the original cuisine that it takes form from. It does not need many ingredients, but an

understanding of the departure from the original. When the dish can appeal to a native where the key ideas and ingredients come from, then I think it works.

Celebrity chefs have become incredibly famous. What is your take on them?

I like to group the celebrity chefs into two groups. There is the celebrity chef who becomes a celebrity for his or her food. These are the ones with the 3-stars, million dollar kitchens and wear Braggard chefware. They walk around their kitchens in whites and have a team of people revering or fearing them. They are great in the kitchen and pay immense focus and attention to the finest of details, so much so that their food is so serious and everything else is of no consequence. Their interests do not lie in the media or TV. other than to perhaps sell a cookbook penned by them or to promote their food. Otherwise they hate TV and any chef on TV is considered a joke.

Then there are people like the late Keith Floyd, Anthony Bourdain, Curtis Stone and even Jamie Oliver. It can be formatted TV shows with gimmicks and competition, a little reality, travel, etc., They are embarrassed to call themselves 'chefs' as they have great respect for the profession. Unless you can stand in front of fire, work a full shift, day-inday-out, and take responsibility for a station or an organisation, it is literally impossible to call yourself a chef. These people (myself included) rely on their ability to communicate and impart technique and information to a discerning public.

Which cuisines do you think are going to explode into the world food scene?

Ideally, it should be healthy, sustainable and tasty. I can see the world moving to eating more vegetables and demanding a higher standard of organic. But then again, you'll never know what's the next big thing.

Running a restaurant and travelling the globe for the food TV programme, how and when do you find time to relax?

Relax? I'm too wound up to have such a luxury. In my world, I think we refer to it as 'sleep'.

Stranded on a deserted island, what cookbooks would you have in your bag of absolute essentials?

- 1. The Professional Chef by the Culinary Institute of America.
- 2. Food Lovers Companion (not a cookbook).

Abode of Peace

Brunei's beginnings

The first thing Antonio Pigafetta would likely to have seen when he arrived in Brunei in 1521 was a village built entirely on water and boats silently gliding by. This was the earliest known mention of Kampong Ayer by a European, chronicled by the Italian historian who was part of Spanish explorer Ferdinand Magellan's crew. He dubbed it the 'Venice of the East'.

Today, some 500 years on, Kampong Ayer retains the image of a tranquil rural community sitting quietly on stilts on the river, albeit with some telltale signs of development, prosperity and modernisation, such as television aerials and satellite dishes. Building materials have changed greatly over the years, but the visual appeal of an entire village on stilts remains undiminished.

Darussalam, the Arabic word translated means 'Abode of Peace'. Brunei's history dates back some 1,500 years. Empirical evidence shows that as early as the 6th century AD, Brunei was already trading with China; whose traders called the Sultanate Puni or Poli. By the 14th century, the Brunei Sultanate had embraced Islam and was the centre of an archipelagic empire that reached as far south as Indonesia and as far north as The Philippines. This empire lasted well into the 16th century.

With Islam, Brunei asserted and expanded its role as an independent and dominant trading power in the region. Its trade and territories grew with the spread of Islam to encompass existing Malay kingdoms in Borneo and the Philippines. Then the Europeans came. With superior armoury, the Spaniards – and later the Portuguese, the Dutch and the British – subjugated the natives of the region and proceeded to impose their form of governments.

Brunei became a British Protectorate in 1888. The signing of the 1906 Treaty brought in the British Residential System and, a British Resident was installed to advise the Sultan on all matters, except those pertaining to the Islamic faith and Malay customs.

Nearly a century later, in 1984, with the declaration of independence by His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Mu'izzaddin Waddaulah, Brunei became a sovereign state with a Malay Muslim Monarchic government.

Brunei today

Brunei is arguably best known today as an oil producing country. Revenue from mineral fuels have accounted for over 95 per cent of Brunei's export earnings. Such wealth has allowed the government to provide its citizens with free education and healthcare, and, there is no personal income tax. Petroleum revenue also supports a large civil service, which employs a substantial percentage of the population. As the country still depends heavily on oil and gas exports, the government has now accelerated efforts to diversify the economy.

Geographically, the Sultanate covers a land area of 5,765 sq kms and lies on Borneo's northwestern shore. It is the oldest Malay state in Borneo. Its immediate neighbours include the Malaysian states of Sabah and Sarawak, and the Indonesian province of Kalimantan. The nation has four districts: Brunei-Muara (which includes the capital Bandar Seri Begawan), Temburong, Tutong and Belait. The main source of its revenue, oil and liquified gas, is from the coastal towns of Seria and Kuala Belait, about 100 kms from the capital city.

Brunei has a population of over 372,000. Two-thirds are of Malay descent, while the remainder consists of members of other ethnic tribes: Chinese and expatriate workers.

Malay is the official language, but English is widely spoken. Although Islam is the official religion, people of other faiths have the freedom to practise their own religions.

Lying just 443 kms north of the equator, Brunei can be hot in some months but wet and pleasantly cool at other times of the year; so much so that 'the wet and the dry' aptly sums up Brunei's two seasons. Blessed with such climatic conditions, tropical Brunei boasts rugged and remote coastlines and unexplored jungles, which are fiercely protected by an environmentally-conscious government. And with good reason too.

Brunei has the best-preserved rainforest on Borneo island. Covering more than 70 per cent of the nation's land area, it is so unique that it features heath and peat swamp forests not found in other parts of Borneo. Its untouched jungles are also home to one of the world's largest population of proboscis monkeys. The diversity of its flora and fauna is astounding, such as the strikingly-hued hornbills and the parasitic pitcher plant. And the volume of this diversity is so great that even today, scientists from London's Natural History Museum and the Brunei Museum continue to identify and document new species. The Royal Geographical Society (UK) and Universiti Brunei Darussalam have also jointly conducted field studies.



Apart from serving the cause of science, the rainforest also provides an outlet for recreational activities. Many of the reserves have picnic facilities, with trekking being a favourite pastime among tourists and expatriates. Among the popular reserves are Belalong, where there is a Rainforest Field Studies Centre, Batang Duri, Sungai Basong, Sungai Liang, Ulu Mendaram, Wasai Wong Kadir, Luagan Lalak, Bukit Shahbandar, Anduki Silver Jubilee Park and the Berakas Forestry Recreation Park. The national parks are situated in Ulu Temburong and Tasek Merimbun. Excursions into Temburong, by jeep or longboat, can be arranged. Elsewhere, boat trips on the Belait and Tutong rivers and dinner cruises on the Brunei River provide a relaxing way to see the country.

In fact, visitors need not leave the city to experience the remarkable rainforest. A natural waterfall and lake set amid jungle-like environs await visitors at the Tasek Lama Recreational Park in the heart of the capital. For sun worshippers, the places to go are Muara Beach on the north coast, Pantai Seri Kenangan in Tutong and Tungku Beach along the Muara-Tutong coastal road.



Brunei's main mosques, the Sultan Omar 'Ali Saifuddien Mosque in the capital and the newer Jame 'Asr Hassanil Bolkiah Mosque in Kiarong, are not only symbols of devotion and sanctuaries for prayer, but architectural wonders as well. Not many man-made structures in the world can rival the sight of the mosque's golden domes gleaming against a seamless tropical sky. Inside and out, Islamic artistic expressions are expressed in astoundingly intricate details.

Visitors are welcomed, but are requested to respect the congregation at prayer times. Footwear is not allowed inside, while female visitors are requested to dress modestly with arms, legs and head covered.

His Majesty's official residence and the seat of government, the *Istana Nurul Iman*, is another grand building. It is the largest residential palace in the world today, stretching more than half a kilometre in length and boasting For culture and history buffs, the Brunei Museum displays an impressive collection of bronze and brassware, Chinese ceramics, jewellery and archaeological artefacts. The Malay Technology Museum showcases traditional cottage industries like boat-making, fishing, gold and silversmith, and house construction. The



1,788 rooms. Once a year, during *Hari Raya Aidilfitri* (Eid-Ul-Fitr), the Sultan opens the gates to his palace, and with his family, warmly receive his subjects and visitors. For the rest of the year, the palace is best appreciated from the riverside recreation park, Persiaran Damuan at Jalan Tutong. This kilometre-long park also features a permanent display of sculptures from various ASEAN artists.

Another point of historical interest is the Tomb of Sultan Bolkiah, Brunei's fifth Islamic monarch. It lies within a mausoleum that commemorates Brunei's golden age, from the 14th and 16th centuries, when Brunei's sovereignty covered Borneo, Indonesia and The Philippines. Nearby, historical remains of the old capital of Kota Batu are being continually unearthed, providing valuable information about this ancient port city. Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah Islamic Exhibition Gallery houses His Majesty's personal collection of holy manuscripts and other artefacts from the Islamic world. But a real crowddrawer is the Royal Regalia Museum, which displays actual royal artefacts, including silver and gold ceremonial armoury, the coronation crown and the chariots used during His Majesty's coronation and Silver Jubilee celebrations. Putting all these in perspective is the original copy of the Brunei Constitution.

A good place to acquire mementos is the Arts and Handicraft Centre where traditional skills in weaving baskets and *kain tenunan* (brocades) using gold and silver threads are on display. Popular souvenirs include the *keris* (an intricately designed ceremonial dagger), miniature replicas of cannons, boats and gongs. Clockwise from right: The kain tenunan, weaved cloth with gold threads and chased silverware are Brunei's premier handicrafts; the canopy walkway in Temburong; the rich marine life found offshore.


A visit to Brunei would certainly be incomplete without a stroll through the wooden alleys of Kampong Aver. Brunei's famed water village on stilts, which is home to some 30,000 residents. While the building materials are certainly much sturdier now, it still is pretty much what Antonio Pigafetta wrote five centuries ago. It certainly is Brunei's most remarkable 'living and breathing' museum. The greeting Assalamualaikum (Peace be upon you) and the smell of rendang (a spicy beef or chicken dish cooked in coconut milk) wafting from the locals' kitchens sum up the Bruneian experience like no other.

Food in Brunei mirrors the nation's wealth of cultural diversity. There are international fast-food outlets and a myriad



of other restaurants that offer Japanese, Indian, Arabic, Italian and of course, local cuisine. And then there is the not-tobe-missed *pasar malam*, or night market at the parking lot near Gadong's wet market. A gourmand's paradise, it is the place to feast on the best homecooked food this side of the South China Sea.

From its jungles to its urban centres, the wealth of diversity truly makes Brunei a Kingdom of Unexpected Treasures.

A Story of Growth

With a fleet of sleek, state-of-the-art Boeings and Airbuses carrying the nation's colours across the globe, the prestigious and award-winning Royal Brunei Airlines has certainly come a long way since a sea-plane was first spotted over Tutong in August 1922. The early days

After the Second World War, Brunei Shell launched the regional commercial aviation operation Percival Prince Services. Royal Brunei Airlines started out with just two Boeing 737s, one of which was put in service for the airline's first flight on 14 May, 1975 from the brand new Brunei International Airport to Singapore. Flights to Hong Kong, Kota Kinabalu and Kuching in East Malaysia also started on the same day.

Within its first year of service, Royal Brunei's two Boeing 737-200 jets and its staff of 84 had successfully moved 36,000 passengers between Bandar Seri Begawan, Singapore, Hong Kong, and Kota Kinabalu.

The following decade saw Royal Brunei expand its regional network with Manila and Bangkok in 1976 and 1977 respectively and Kuala Lumpur and Jakarta added in 1981 and 1984.

Asia and beyond...

In the mid-1980s, three extended-range Boeing 757-200s replaced the 737s which allowed Royal Brunei to stretch its transoceanic reach to Dubai in 1988, London in 1990, and Perth in 1991. With this great expansion, the airline enriched its gracious brand of hospitality with cabin crew recruited from Brunei's ASEAN neighbours.

As Royal Brunei's reputation for service excellence grew, the airline added Jeddah to its destination list in 1991 and expansion continued into the twenty-first century with the addition of Brisbane in 1994, Surabaya in 1997, Auckland in 2003, and Ho Chi Minh City in 2006.

In 2003, the delivery of two new Airbus 319 aircraft marked the beginning of Royal Brunei's re-fleeting programme and two Airbus 320s have been added since.

First class sky services

In 2001 Royal Brunei fully entered the cyber sphere with the launch of its Online Booking facility, enabling the airline to reach a wider audience. BlueSky Fares, the low cost internet booking engine facility was added in 2004, offering great-value economy class fares to selected destinations. Royal Skies, the airline's popular frequent flyer programme, was launched in mid-2003 to boost sales, as well as customer loyalty. Royal Skies continues to set itself apart from other loyalty programmes with its straight forward simplicity and generosity in redeeming rewards.

As Royal Brunei continues to make convenience a priority for its customers, E-Ticketing was launched in 2004 to ensure greater flexibility and efficiency in booking, ticket issuance and check-in procedures.

Royal Brunei's 'food fit to fly by' meal concept was introduced in to Business Class in 2003. Designed by Chef Michel Roux Jr, of the Le Gavroche restaurant in London this unique in-flight menu features healthier and lighter meal options. The 'Dine Upon Request' meal concept was introduced in November 2005. International gourmet meals and refreshments are served up until 90 minutes before landing, giving long haul Business Class passengers the option of choosing to dine on their desired meal at a time that suits them.

For maximum in-flight comfort, Royal Brunei introduced SkyDreamer seats in its retro-fitted B767 in 2004. The state of the art, private cabin style 'podded' seating includes a personal pullup screen and extends to nearly two metres when fully-reclined to provide extra privacy.



In the Economy cabin, re-designed seating now offers greater comfort, with adjustable head and foot rests, generous recline, 8.4 inch personal screens showing SkyShow entertainment and award winning meals.

Available in both Economy and Business cabins, the centrepiece of Royal Brunei's inflight entertainment system is the exclusive SkyShow, which offers 17 on-demand movie channels, five short feature broadcast channels, 10 game channels, over 200 on-demand audio channels, and 15 entertainment channels offered in a variety of languages – English, Malay, Mandarin and Hindi.

Brunei International Airport

Brunei International Airport's computerised passenger and cargo handling facilities can handle 1.5 million passengers and 50,000 tonnes of cargo a year and the airport is currently being expanded for traffic growth.

Among the facilities offered at the airport are a prayer room, telephones and internet services, restaurants, a viewing gallery and day rooms for transit passengers who want to rest or freshen up before flying.

Comfort Onboard

At Royal Brunei Airlines, your health, safety and comfort is of prime importance to us. For your general well-being onboard our flights, we would recommend the basic inflight exercises.

Ankle rotation

While seated, raise one foot and draw a circle with your toes, 12-15 times clockwise, 12-15 times counterclockwise. You can do one foot at a time, or both feet at the same time.





Knee lift

Lift and hug your knee to your chest as close as you can. Hold for 10-12 seconds. Do the same with the other knee, alternating 10-12 times.

One health issue that is of primary concern is the 'economy class syndrome', also known as 'traveller's thrombosis' or 'deep vein thrombosis (DVT)'.

This is a condition where blood collects in the feet and legs as a result of sitting for long periods of time; such as on long trips. In rare medical cases, a clot forms and blocks a major blood vessel, which could be fatal.

It is a misnomer, however, that only economy class passengers are exposed to this risk and discomfort. Those in first and business class cabins, as well as people in theatres, buses, cars, and even offices can just as easily develop DVT. In other words, anyone who has to remain relatively immobile for prolonged periods is at risk.

While research on DVT is still inconclusive, Royal Brunei Airlines has developed a simple guideline that could minimise the risk and make flying with us more comfortable.

Medical warning

You should see a doctor first before booking a flight if you have

any of the following conditions: previous or family history of DVT, malignancy, presently undergoing hormone treatment, blood disorders, recent trauma to the lower limbs, a heart condition, varicose veins, and are pregnant.

Shoulder roll Relax shoulders, and then hunch them forward. Rotate gently 10-12 times.





Upper back flex Stretch hands forward, then pull back slowly as far as possible. Repeat 10-12 times.

You may be feeling the onset of DVT if:

- you feel tenderness or pain in the calf muscles,
- swelling in the leg. You should, however, know that the feet and legs do swell a bit particularly during long journeys due to the accumulation of water because of gravity,
- the temperature of your leg rises, and/or
- the veins right below the leg's skin dilate.

Exercises

Airline passengers do not have much room for physical activity.

But exercises to relax the muscles and improve blood circulation in your legs can be done from the comfort of your own seat.

Other health tips

The aircraft's cabin atmosphere at an altitude of 10,000 m is pressurised and very dry. You are also travelling from one time zone to another. These factors combined can upset your body's rhythm.

Thus you can do yourself a favour by:

- drinking lots of fluid during the flight,
- avoiding coffee, tea and liquor. These

are diuretics, i.e. substances that make you visit the lavatory more often,

- avoiding wearing contact lenses. If you must wear them, be sure to apply eye drops regularly,
- moisturising your lips and skin often,
- eating moderately before and during the flight, as physical inactivity slows digestion, and
- wear comfortable clothing.

If you have any health condition that requires special medical attention, for example if you need to inject insulin, inform the reservations officer so you can be properly advised of procedures.

TRAVELLER'S GUIDE Brunei Visitor Information

Visas Austrian, German, Malaysian, Singaporean, British nationals with the right of abode in the United Kingdom, The Netherlands and New Zealand nationals are exempted from the requirement to obtain a visa for visits not exceeding 30 days. American passport holders can enter Brunei Darussalam for three months without visas. For nationals of Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Luxembourg, Republic of Maldives, Norway, Oman, The Philippines, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand and The Principality of Liechtenstein — visas are waived for 14-day visits. Nationals of Australia are issued visas on arrival at the Brunei International Airport for visits not exceeding 30 days.

All other visitors entering Brunei Darussalam must have visas obtainable from any Brunei Darussalam diplomatic mission abroad. These visas are normally issued for a two-week stay but can be renewed in Brunei. Visitors must hold onward tickets and sufficient funds to support themselves while in the country.

N.B. For more details, please contact your nearest Brunei Embassy or diplomatic representative.

Duty-free goods Passengers will not be charged duty for carrying up to 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars, or 227 grammes of tobacco; two bottles of liquor plus 12 cans of beer (only for non-Muslims); and a reasonable quantity of perfumes.

Transportation The airport is about 11 kms from the capital. Taxis, car rentals and buses are available.

Currency The Brunei dollar is on a par with the Singapore dollar, which is also accepted in Brunei. Banks, hotels and many department stores will cash traveller's cheques. Language Malay is the official language but English is widely used. Other languages include Chinese and its dialect variants and other indigenous dialects. Although the official religion is Islam, other faiths including Christianity and Buddhism are practised.

Clothing Light clothing is advisable as the climate is generally warm and humid. Women are requested to dress modestly in keeping with local customs.

Health Doctors provide private medical services for a nominal charge. There are a number of state health clinics and hospitals.

Credit cards Hotels, department stores and other major establishments generally accept all internationally known credit cards.

Tipping Optional. Some hotels add a 10 per cent service charge to their room rates.

Telephones Overseas calls can be made from hotel rooms through the operator, or via international direct dialling (IDD). There are also coin and phonecard operated public telephones.

Utilities Power supply is 220 - 240 volts, 50 cycles. The PAL and NTSC systems are used by local television. Tap water is generally safe to drink although some take the precaution of boiling it.

Media Radio Television Brunei has nightly news bulletins and a range of popular entertainment in both English and Malay. Cable network and Malaysian television programmes can also be received. There are three local daily newspapers namely: *Borneo Bulletin* (English), *The Brunei Times* (English) and *Media Permata* (Malay). Other regional and international publications are also available at newstands. **Food** For the adventurous, the food stalls offer Malay favourites, such as *satay* (barbecued meat on a skewer) and local dishes prepared with curry or coconut milk. Chinese, European and Indian cuisines are also available.

Hotels Accommodation in the capital ranges from international standard to middle range hotels. Service apartments are also available at reasonable rates.

Shopping Department stores and shops offer goods ranging from cosmetics and stereos to local handicrafts such as the *keris* (an ornamental dagger), miniature brass cannons, and *kain tenunan*, a cloth woven with gold or silver threads.

Festivals and celebrations National Day, 23 February, *Hari Raya*, the end of the Muslim fasting month, and His Majesty The Sultan's birthday, July 15. Other public holidays include Chinese Lunar New Year and Christmas.

Customs and courtesy

- Thoughtful visitors learn to appreciate the nation's devotion to Islam. In mosques, visitors should remove their shoes and should not pass in front of people at prayer. Never touch the *Al-Quran*. A woman should ensure that her head, knees and arms are covered before entering mosques. Robes are provided at the entrance to the mosque.
- A Bruneian shakes hands lightly and brings his hands to his chest. Members of the opposite sex do not shake hands.
- It is impolite to point with the index finger (use the right thumb instead) or to beckon someone with fingers and palm facing upwards. Instead the whole hand should

be waved with palm facing downwards. The right fist should never be smacked into the left palm.

 Gifts, particularly food, are passed with the right hand. When sitting, the sole of your feet should not be pointed towards your companions.

ADVICE Bruneians Travelling Abroad

If Brunei citizens encounter problems while travelling abroad, help can be sought from the High Commissions or Embassies of Brunei Darussalam.

Many problems can be avoided by careful preparation prior to departure and by ensuring compliance with the laws of the countries visited. Before leaving Brunei Darussalam:

- Ensure that you have a return ticket or, if this is not possible, set aside sufficient funds to buy a return ticket.
- Reserve money to cover emergencies including the possibility that you may need to pay the airline to carry baggage in excess of your weight allowance.
- Buy travel insurance, especially if you are travelling to distant countries.
- Ensure that your passport is valid.
- Ascertain the visa requirements of the countries you are visiting and comply with those requirements. Information can be obtained from the appropriate embassy or high commission in Brunei Darussalam or from your travel agent.

- Ascertain and comply with the health regulations of the countries you are visiting.
- Remember that most countries punish narcotics offenders with heavy fines, imprisonment or even death.
- Avoid carrying unnecessary jewellery and other valuables. If you must take valuable items, be very careful how you use or wear them. Always store them safely when not in use. Most hotels have safe deposit boxes.
- Find out if the country you are visiting limits (or bans) the importation, sale or use of liquor

 ensuring that you comply with those regulations.
- Check out the laws applying to the importation of farm produce (or items containing farm produce), as well as live or dead plants and animals (including items made from or containing elements derived from plants or animals) of the country you are visiting. A written consent may be needed to import these items. Information can be obtained from the embassy or high commission of the country concerned.

- Refuse to accept packages for inclusion in your luggage from strangers. As a minimum precaution, the contents of the package should be thoroughly examined because it may contain illegal substances. If in any doubt, politely refuse.
- Always allow plenty of time for your journey to the airport, especially in countries which are prone to traffic jams. Arriving late to find the airport checkin desk closed causes ill feeling, and you will miss your flight.
- When you reach your destination call the appropriate airline or travel agent as soon as possible to reconfirm your onward or return flight booking.

The safety and well-being of any traveller is largely his or her responsibility. Most problems can be avoided by ascertaining the regulations applying to each country being visited and planning well in advance to ensure that you comply with those requirements.


